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From the Desk of the President

Dear Friends and Supporters,

It is with immense pride and gratitude that I reflect on yet another deeply fulfilling year. This journey would not have been possible without your steadfast support, encouragement, and unwavering belief in our mission.

Over the past year, we have focused our energies on strengthening the quality of our programmes, expanding our services to underprivileged communities, investing in our team through targeted training and addressing critical



infrastructure needs across other centres. We also initiated an improved MIS and completed the digital archiving of Palna records, key steps toward enhancing efficiency, transparency, and long-term impact.

Looking ahead, one of our most ambitious undertakings is the reconstruction of our Janakpuri Centre. With your continued support and our collective fundraising efforts, we are confident of completing the project by December 2025 and resuming full operations in early 2026.

Some of the most heartwarming moments this year have come from reconnecting with children from *Palna* who are now thriving across the globe. Ben, living in Belgium, has triumphed over physical challenges to become a two-time world table tennis champion. Priyanka, just 13, continues to grow with resilience and grace despite her hearing impairment. And Elizabeth's visit - accompanied by her family - was especially emotional as she reunited with Ms. Loraine Campos, whose photograph she had cherished since her adoption in 1991. These are the stories that keep us inspired and reaffirm the purpose behind all that we do.

We are proud to share several recent achievements by our children and youth - our vocational training students won three awards at the NGO Youth Mela; two gold medals by our VTP and SHS students at a national level competition organised by Punjab State Council for Child Welfare; children from our Bal Chetna programme brought home three medals from Divyalympics 2024; two students supported through our Educational Sponsorship Programme secured admission to prestigious BTech colleges; 1,184 children were enrolled in the Palna WeeKids programme, of which 478 successfully gained school admission; 1,324 young girls enrolled in our vocational training programme, with 577 earning NSDC certification; and 984 students received educational sponsorship support to continue their schooling.

In terms of expansion, we were delighted to inaugurate a new centre in Shahbad Dairy, a Palna WeeKids unit in New Seemapuri and a computer training centre at Qudsia Bagh, offering preschool learning, supervised homework support, and vocational training to around 98 new beneficiaries. These gradual expansions are an important step forward in our mission of providing early childhood education and digital literacy to empower our young beneficiaries.

We also undertook much-needed infrastructure repairs at the Palna nurses' quarters, Trilokpuri, and other centres, ensuring safer and more welcoming spaces for our children and staff. Capacity-building workshops for our vocational instructors - focused on computer literacy, tailoring, and beauty culture and Bal Chetna - were made possible through the invaluable support of Nykaa Foundation and IDFC First Bank. Our wellness focus included yoga and workshops on health awareness, mental health, self-defence and POCSO training for our beneficiaries and caregivers.

We were humbled to receive the Mahatma Award for Social Impact, along with recognitions from the Gresham Charitable Giving Trust (Australia) and CAF America - acknowledgements that reinforce our values of transparency, impact, and service.

Our heartfelt thanks go to AIIMS, Clove Dental, India Vision Institute and the Max Foundation for organising vital health camps, and to ICICI Foundation and Ujjivan Small Finance Bank for delivering financial literacy workshops for our beneficiaries and staff.

It was also an honour to welcome Ambassador Hiroshi Suzuki and his wife to *Palna*, who generously donated two electric wheelchairs. We remain grateful to our institutional partners - Asian Supply Chain, Azim Premji Foundation, CDPQ, Edrington, EXL India, Gateway Distriparks, IDFC First Bank, Interarch Building Products, International Action (Italy), Interpedia Finland, Ion Foundation, Leiner Shoes, Mayawala Trust, Mulani Foundation, Nykaa Foundation, Rotary Midwest, WestBridge Capital, and many more - for their unwavering support. PALNA™/ Adoption Programme

(Established 1978)

An unassuming building next to Qudsia Bagh in Civil Lines, Delhi, with the sun combing through the green cover and the heavy iron gates into the main yard, is PALNA, our home for abandoned and lost children, as well as an adoption centre. It is one of our oldest and most well-known programmes. The name *palna* appropriately is a Hindi word which doubles as the English noun 'cradle' and the verb 'nurture'. Formally established in 1978, Palna's history is marked by the compassion and unwavering commitment of all those who have been associated with it. Today, Palna is home to **80-90 abandoned and destitute children** at any given time.



The *palna* placed outside the centre allows a child to be placed in it anonymously. This is how we receive most of our children. The others come through the police and hospitals, and occasionally, families come to the home to relinquish a child.

A sensor on the cradle is activated by the weight of a child and sets off a siren, immediately prompting a nurse to come out and bring the child in. Children often arrive in a precarious state of health, ranging from extremely low birth weight and hypothermia in infants, trauma and congenital defects or mental / physical disabilities. Our in-house medical crisis unit is equipped to handle emergencies among infants and newborns. We have a team of dedicated round-the-clock doctors and nurses, as well as physiotherapist, special educator, counsellor, social workers, care-givers and teachers. Mortality at Palna today is negligible and our efforts have resulted in the children's milestones being near normal despite institutionalisation and a poor start in life. We take pride in referring to Palna as a home, and not an institution.

Efforts are initiated to trace the family of the child. Only after it is established that the child is abandoned and the Child Welfare Committee has declared the child legally free for adoption, are efforts made to place the child in adoption through the centralised portal set up by the Ministry of Women and Child Development. To date, we have placed over 3300 children in loving families, after rigorous screening procedures.





Palna Bal Chetna: Palna continues to receive an increasing number of children with profound disabilities – both mental and physical. As these children are rarely adopted, the percentage of special needs children in our care is quite significant. This is a serious challenge as such children need long-term intensive care and specialised resources on an everyday basis. There are very few residential homes for such children in Delhi. We remain committed to help all the children achieve their physical and mental potential, regardless of their disabilities.

This year in focus

- **150 children** were resident at Palna through this year, of which 78 were new arrivals. An almost **50% increase** from last year
- Adoption processes remain slow due to the necessary checks by the State and Central Governments as mandated by the recent guidelines.
- The percentage of special needs children is very high, being close to 50 percent.
- 33 children were restored to the biological parents.
- The **digitisation of records of all Palna children** since 1978 was completed, alongside a data entry / retrieval software.
- The pre-school programme running in-house was enhanced to cover a wider age group with more than 20 children attending daily.
- Palna children enjoyed a variety of fun and educational outings including Kidzania, Cubby Cove and Delhi Zoological Park.
- The much-needed renovation of the Nurses' quarters at Palna was completed.
- An informative session on the Protection Of Children From Sexual Offenses Act (POCSO), was conducted for the Palna caregivers by child protection expert, Mrs. Karuna Narang. Additionally, a team from IBHAS conducted a session on stress management. The caregivers were also taken on a retreat.
- One of our Palna alumni and her family have been instrumental in Palna winning first prize from the Gresham Charitable Giving Committee, Sydney.


- As always, we had several of our adopted children, now adults (and some married) visiting us along with their families, from across the world.
- Palna Day was celebrated on 22nd March a joyous evening as children who began their journey at Palna came with their families and celebrated together.






- H.E. Hiroshi Suzuki, Japanese Ambassador and his wife Mrs. Eiko Susuki honoured Palna with a visit in August. They discussed in depth the issues faced in caring for special needs children. Before leaving India, they donated two electric wheelchairs. Sonu, a very bright ten-year-old with congenital brittle bones, learnt to use the wheelchair very quickly, and was able to move independently for the first time in his life! The joy that lit up his face is indescribable!
- Rotary Midwest Trust fulfilled a long-felt need in Palna by installing a laundry unit comprising washing machines and dryers.
- Oral health camps were organised by AIIMs, Max Hospital and Clove Dental.
- We are grateful to Gateway Distriparks Ltd, Ion Foundation, Arpan Prayas, Tirath Ram Charitable Hospital, SMS Water Grace BMW Pvt Ltd, Indian Territorial Army, Dalmia Trust and other well-wishers for their continued support.

Two children expired: one a severely mentally challenged child with Down's syndrome, who had been in Palna for one year; the other was a 5-year-old who expired within a day of arriving at Palna with critical internal injuries. Both expired in hospital.

Ruchi: Her remarkable journey

In February 2022, one month-old, baby Ruchi arrived at PALNA, through the cradle at our gate. Born with multiple congenital conditions and weighing only 2.3 kg, Ruchi was dehydrated and medically fragile — but her feisty spirit, even then, was undeniable. In the medical check-up on arrival baby Ruchi was diagnosed with Nager Syndrome, a rare genetic disorder characterised by facial and limb deformities. She had complex craniofacial clefts which did not allow her to take any feed through her mouth or vocalise. Her condition required immediate medical intervention and long-term multi-disciplinary care.



From the very beginning, Ruchi was surrounded by a dedicated team of doctors, special educator, physiotherapists, caregivers, all working together to give her the best chance at life. Doctors at Lok Nayak Hospital and AIIMS, put surgical plans in place. In February 2023, she underwent her first complex facial plastic surgery. Despite post-surgical complications, she fought through recovery with incredible resilience.

Over the next year, she continued with nasogastric feeding, and began rehabilitative therapies: occupational therapy, physiotherapy, speech stimulation, and special education. Her caregivers ensured she received the best possible nutritional support and stimulation in a loving environment.

In April 2025, Ruchi underwent her second surgery, repairing her lip and palate. This has enabled her to finally transition successfully from tube feeding to oral feeding — a huge milestone in her recovery.

Despite developmental delays, Ruchi has made remarkable progress. Her motor development is catching up, and she is now able to climb stairs, is able to vocalise, and follows simple commands. Her psychological assessments show steady improvements in

social skills, and she joyfully participates in group play. Her caregivers celebrate each new word, smile, and step. She also interacts by saying "hello" and "bye-bye".

Ruchi is currently under regular follow-up at AIIMS for upcoming surgical procedures and therapy sessions. Her journey is far from over, but her story is already a testament to the power of care, medical support, and love.

Vocational Training Programme

(Established in 1976)

Our Vocational Training Programme is designed to empower young adolescent girls from underprivileged families living in the slum and resettlement colonies of Delhi, by skilling them in vocational competencies that will directly impact their income-generating potential. The programme **operates out of 12 centres** across Delhi, and is drawing **over 1300 young participants** annually.

The main courses offered are Beauty & Wellness, Stitching & Tailoring, and Computer training. The courses have been chosen with an eye towards skills that would also allow the girls to work within or near their homes. Alongside, the participants also get introduced to health and hygiene, sex education, and financial literacy sessions.





All our vocational training courses are accredited by National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC). The reach of the programme the year 2024-25 has been as follows:


Key features of the programme

- All our courses are offered only to girls within the age group of 13 to 21 years.
- The syllabus is in module format with well-defined course content and time frame.
- Experienced and trained instructors.
- Recognition from National Skill Development Corporation
- Safe and secure environment for girls; CCTV monitored.
- Regular interactions with parents
- Counselling and sessions on social skills, financial literacy and self-defense.

This year in focus

- **1324 beneficiaries reached** across all courses., which is more than a 35% increase over last year.
- **577 trainees** successfully completed the National Skill Development Council course and cleared the exam with flying colours were awarded their certificates.
- Nykaa Foundation supported the operations of Beauty and Wellness and stitching in all centres. Regular capacity-building and refresher sessions by experts for our instructors were organised with their support.
- A generous donation from Mr. Ramit Budhraja and Star Cement enabled us to start a new unit each of Beauty & Wellness, and Stitching & Tailoring training at our Qudsia Bagh premises.
- Our long-term partners EXL supported the refurbishment of one of our Trilokpuri centres, transforming it into a dedicated vocational training facility.
- India Vision Institute conducted free vision screening programme in January across all our centres, covering beneficiaries, parents and staff. 188 girls received free spectacles.
- Rotary Club of Midwest Delhi enabled the refurbishment of the Stitching & Tailoring unit at our Madipur centre.
- A ten-day self-defence training for our trainees was conducted at three centres by the Delhi Police (Special Police Unit for Women and Children), in November.
- 2 students from our computer training unit at Trilokpuri have been employed by EXL.
- Six students from our Vocational Training programme & Supervised Homework Scheme (SHS), New Seemapuri Centre, along with two Instructors attended the 39th National Learn to Live Together camp held in Mohali from 23rd-29th June 2024. They won gold medals in creative collage making and Kathak dance.
- The ICICI Foundation and Ujjivan Small Finance bank organised financial literacy sessions in August- October 2024 for 510 vocational training trainees, with a focus on schemes run by the government for the benefit of girls and women.
- Manzil Mystics & Students from IP College conducted sessions on menstrual and personal hygiene, and balanced nutrition at several of our centres.
- Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Limited joined forces with the teams at our Trilokpuri centres to celebrate their 50th anniversary.
- Rotaract Club of Sanskriti School organised sessions on cyber security, menstrual hygiene, and gender equality for our computer trainees at Qudsia Bagh.
- Clove Dental & Max Super Specialty Hospital, Patparganj organised a check-up camp for our VTP and SHS girls at Qudsia Bagh centre, under their CSR initiative.
- Educational tours were organised in November and December.
- Diwali Melas were organised at all centres in October where the girls showcased their skills in mehndi and rangoli making, and sold products like candles, diyas and toys made by them.

Anshika : Daring to dream

Anshika, 19, got enrolled in our Computer Programme at New Seema Puri centre in 2024. She belongs to a family of four comprising her mother and two siblings. Her mother works as a domestic help and has been managing the household after the death of Anshika's father. Her elder brother works in a private company and younger sister is studying in school. Earlier, when Anshika had enrolled in our Supervised Homework Scheme, she was quite average in her academics, as well as being a shy and diffident girl. However she always made an effort to improve. Our instructor Ms. Geeta always encouraged her to dream of a better future where she could help support to the family and herself.



After her schooling completed, our instructor counselled Anshika and also advised her mother to get Anshika enrolled in our Computer training programme. Anshika enrolled in our Data Entry Operator course. The group discussions and co-curricular activities helped in building her confidence, and the mock interviews helped her prepare. All these efforts paid off well when she applied for and got selected as Data Entry Operator in a good private company as soon as she finished her course.

Anshika's story is a powerful reminder that with determination and support, young women can overcome even the most difficult circumstances. We are proud of her achievements and wish her continued success in all her future endeavours.

Educational Sponsorship Programme

(Established 1979)

The Educational Sponsorship Programme aims to encourage parents of school-going aged children, from lower income groups, to send their children to school and to ensure that they stay enrolled, by providing financial support, coaching, and career counselling to the children. The academic performance of the children is also monitored. We give priority to girls, children with disabilities, and children from single-parent households. The financial stipend that is disbursed to the children on a quarterly basis, is to cover the extra expenses of transportation, school supplies, books, and uniforms for children enrolled in schools. This amount is from donor individuals and organisations who sponsor one or more children. This year the programme **benefited 984 children**.





Key features of the programme


- Special focus on the girl child and children from single-parent households.
- One-time special assistance for meritorious students to support their further studies or coaching after Class XII.
- Counselling and motivational support to help students from classes 8th to 12th in selecting appropriate academic streams and career paths.
- Sessions on personal hygiene along with preventive health check-ups to promote overall well-being among students.

This year in focus

- **984 children** benefited from this initiative, as compared to 825 last years.
- This year we registered **238 new beneficiaries**.
- 61 students successfully completed their 12th standard this year, and therefore moved out of the programme.
- Career counselling was organised for Class VIII to Class XII students.
- Along with the stipend and career counselling, the children also received stationery and an annual gift.
- Satyam and Harsh, two of our beneficiaries have done us and their sponsors proud! They excelled in their Class XII Board exams in 2024, and then secured admission for Bachelor of Technology (B.Tech) courses in prestigious universities.

 A one-time financial assistance support was given to 8 students who scored an outstanding 80% and above in 12th board exam, to help them pursue further studies.

Satyam: High achiever

Satyam joined the Educational Sponsorship Programme when he was in the 3rd grade. Despite the loss of his father to brain cancer and the financial struggles faced by his mother, Satyam's determination and hard work propelled him towards success.

The sponsorship programme provided him with muchneeded financial support, counselling sessions, and health check-ups, ensuring both his mind and body stayed healthy.

Satyam's consistent efforts paid off when he achieved an outstanding 93% in the Class XII Board Exams. He was rewarded with a one-time assistance of Rs. 30,000 from DCCW towards his JEE Mains coaching, as he wanted to



pursue Engineering from a reputed institution. His hard work paid off when he scored an impressive 97.8% in the JEE Mains and his relentless determination has earned him admission at the prestigious Delhi Technological University!

Driven by his dream of becoming a software engineer and uplifting his family, Satyam also dedicates his free time to tutoring children in his locality. We are confident he will continue to make us proud.

PALNA WeeKids

(Established 2019)

The PALNA WeeKids (PWK) is designed to prepare young underprivileged children aged 2.5 to 6 years for entry into mainstream schools. Currently this programme operates across 13 centres located in slum, resettlement and rural areas of Delhi. Each centre has about 40 children. This year **1184 children availed this facility** across all the centres. Of these, **478 children, comprising over 90% of those eligible, secured admission in government or local public schools.**

Early Childhood Education (ECE) is widely acknowledged as critical to a child's cognitive, emotional, and social development. Research indicates that over 90% of brain development occurs before the age of six, making early education essential for ensuring school readiness, improving school completion rates, and setting the foundation for lifelong success. Driven by this understanding, the PALNA WeeKids (PWK) is designed to promote school readiness and long-term educational achievement. Evidence from the programme shows that children enrolled in PWK consistently outperform their peers.





Key features of the programme


- Focus on the child at an individual level.
- Activity and play based curriculum with structured daily and weekly plans.
- Discourage rote learning.
- Safe, nurturing, learning environment.
- Involvement of parents reinforces learning beyond the classroom.
- Social skills and healthy habits inculcated.
- Guiding parents through the school admission process.

This year in focus

- We extended the programme by starting a new unit at our New Seemapuri centre.
- A two-day Instructors workshop was conducted by an expert trainer on Early Childhood Care & Education.
- In July 2024 our 5 centres organised farewell events for children who were admitted to regular schools, celebrating their achievements and wishing them well on their onward educational journey.

- Educational tours were organised for PWK children in November and December to the Doll Museum, Rail Museum & Bal Bhawan.
- The EXL team continued their generous support to DCCW by donating multiple sets of summer uniforms for all our Palna WeeKids children.
- Clove Dental conducted a health camp at our Janakpuri centre.

Manshu: Coming out of his shell

Manshu's journey at our Trilokpuri centre started in April 2024 when he joined the PWK programme, aged just over 2.5 years. His parents were concerned about his extreme introversion and insecurity—he rarely interacted with other children, clung to his feeding bottle, and often cried. On his first days at the centre, Manshu avoided group activities, refused to eat, and remained isolated.

Recognising his needs, the instructor and helper offered him constant attention, gently engaging him through play and interaction. Gradually, he was encouraged to join group activities, which he soon began to enjoy. During lunch breaks, special efforts were made to help him transition from bottle-feeding to eating solid food, while



his parents were also counselled on how to support his progress at home. Their cooperation, especially as they observed his steady improvement, was invaluable.

Within three months, Manshu had transformed into an active child and participating in each activity or celebration at the centre. He has even been selected as "Star of the Month".

Recently, Manshu has secured admission in Dream Rose Public School, Trilokpuri, winning hearts with his cheerful attitude! His story is a testament to the power of patient guidance, supportive parenting, and a nurturing environment.

Supervised Homework Scheme

(Established 1958)

DCCW'S Supervised Homework Scheme (SHS) provides academic assistance to school-going children in classes I–VIII. These children belong to low-income families whose monthly income is below Rs. 25,000/-. The programme's primary goal is to improve the children's academic performance and prevent school dropout by providing the support their families are unable to offer with their schoolwork. A total of **423 children attended Homework scheme** at the 14 centres where this programme is run.





Key features of the programme


- Qualified, experienced, female teachers, who are evaluated annually.
- Volunteer support from university students and retired teachers.
- Personal attention given to each child.
- Rote learning discouraged.
- Monthly tests to assess the level of understanding. School report cards monitored.
- Focus on holistic development through recreational activities, puzzles, nature walks, development of social skills, healthy habits etc.
- Children with good performance are integrated into our Educational Sponsorship programme.
- Special sessions on leadership, team building and communication.
- Progress updates to parents.

This year in focus

- There were **423 beneficiaries this year as compared to 285 last year**, due to the focus on increasing the reach of the programme.
- As part of their CSR campaign, a team from Tirath Ram Shah Charitable Hospital visited 3 of our centres and conducted a wide spectrum of assessments of the children, and provided step-by-step guidance to the parents on how to understand and respond effectively to their children's behavioural changes.
- Adiva Goel, a student of the British School, was awarded the prestigious EARCOS Global Citizenship Award and community Service Grant for her exceptional work "The Ourchive Project" which she did in collaboration with DCCW. Though five

- interactive workshops with our SHS children she provided a platform to marginalised voices. . She generously donated her award to DCCW.
- Mahindra & Mahindra marked their Foundation Day by inviting our children from the New Seemapuri centre to their office and presented them with backpacks and study materials.
- Our students participated in the NGO Mela organised by YMCA and made us proud by winning awards in the mehendi, debate and poster making competitions.

Deepak: From Struggling Student to Confident Learner

Deepak, a student of Class IV was struggling to cope with his schoolwork with no one at home to assist him.

During a community survey by our staff, Deepak's father met our Trilokpuri centre team and learnt about our Supervised Homework Scheme programme. He immediately enrolled Deepak and his two siblings in the programme.

When Deepak joined in January 2024, he could only recognise alphabets. Assessing his capabilities and interests, our instructor drafted a personalised lesson plan. With concistent support, Deepak was able to read words in Hindi and English and started



taking interest in Mathematics as well. The improvement in school boosted his confidence and curiosity. Progressing to Class V, Deepak had developed interest in his books and practiced reading them.

Today, Deepak can confidently read in both Hindi and English, and has scored excellent marks in his school examinations. Deepak's transformation has brought joy to his family, pride to his teachers, and encouragement to our entire team.

Bal Chetna Day-care Programme

(Established 2002)

The **Bal Chetna Day-Care Programme** is focused on providing comprehensive day-care and rehabilitation services to children with special needs from underprivileged families. The services provided include day-care, physiotherapy, special education and speech therapy and nutrition, and are tailored to meet individual needs so as to make the child as self-reliant and communicative as possible. The programme also provides support systems to families with such children so that they are not driven to abandon them.

After being suspended throughout the pandemic, this programme was re-started in January 2023 at our Janakpuri centre and has been since been running successfully at full capacity. We are grateful to our partners **IDFCFIRST Bank** for financial and operational support through their *Ekprayas* initiative. In February 2025, we re-started the unit at our Sultanpuri centre.





Key features of the programme


- All rehabilitation services under one roof: Special Education, Speech therapy Physiotherapy, Supplementary Nutrition and Medical care.
- Trained, experienced and RCI registered staff.
- Tailor-made intervention for each child.
- Focus on activities of daily living through the medium of games and music.
- Monthly progress updates to parents.
- Social skills and healthy habits inculcated.

This year in focus

- 35 children enrolled in the programme at Janakpuri centre throughout the year
- Programme **extended to our Sultanpuri centre** in February 11 children enrolled till March 2025.
- 9 of our children have started going to regular school.
- Along with necessary rehabilitation therapies, children are also provided with supplementary nutrition which includes egg, milk, curd, fruits, etc.
- Typhoid vaccination drive covered 29 children who were vaccinated at the centre.

- A doctor performed weekly medical check-ups for all the children.
- Quarterly health camps including eye / dental / blood checkups were conducted.
- Quarterly assessments are maintained for each child with precise progress tracking.
- Regular parent-teacher meetings, and workshops for parents on mental health by ASTHA, NGO expert in Inclusion and Disability
- Weekly home visits were started by the staff to support the family and parents and to assess the efficiency of home program.
- 9 children participated in Divyalympics 2024, and won 3 medals a gold, a silver and a bronze.
- On World Disability Day, children were taken on an outing to National Rail Museum.
- All festivals and national days were also celebrated at the centre.

NAINA: Dedication leads to progress

Naina Kumari, a 6-year-old special needs child enrolled in our Bal Chetna programme in April 2023. She was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at birth. When enrolled, she was unable to stand independently, relied on crawling for mobility, had a weak grip, experienced drooling, and exhibited delays in speech.

She has been undergoing physiotherapy, speech therapy and special education sessions. In speech therapy she practices blowing exercise, picture identification, cheek massage and lip exercises. In physiotherapy, she has stretching exercises to reduce muscle tightness and promote walking. Initially she practiced walking with a walker, and eventually progressed to



practicing walking without the walker. In special education classes, she practices scribbling, tracing, and activities of daily living. In September 2024 she started taking a few steps by herself, and is now walking and playing ball with her friends. Drooling has also stopped, and she can speak a few words and express herself very well.

Naina's progress has been truly heartening—not just for her family, but for all of us at *Bal Chetna*. Her journey is a powerful reminder of the impact of early intervention, dedicated therapy, and inclusive education.

The Mahatma Award is a prestigious national award that recognises contributions to the public, private, and development sectors, including philanthropy, sustainability, shared value, and corporate social responsibility. The jury members included Dr. Kiran Bedi, Ms. Tara Gandhi Bhattacharjee, Ms. Rajashree Birla and Gandhian Mr. Amit Sachdeva.



The award presentation was held on 1st October in New Delhi. Team DCCW had the privilege and honour of receiving this award from Dr. Kiran Bedi and Mr. Sachdeva.

This honour encourages us to continue our mission with passion and integrity, serving abandoned, underprivileged, and special children, with renewed dedication.

Centres & Infrastructure

Re-construction of our flagship programme Centre at Janakpuri

As mentioned in last year's annual report, our flagship Janakpuri centre had to be closed in March 2023 due to structural issues in the building, and after detailed assessments by experts, it was concluded that the building would be need to be demolished and rebuilt. The project estimate exceeds our annual organisational budget, and is a major challenge for an NGO like ours, and seeking



funds for this project has been our priority through the year, and continues to be so as we have raised just over half the amount necessary.

In July 2024, the re-construction of a 2-storey building was initiated with a small Bhoomi puja and the work on the foundation started immediately thereafter. Given sufficient funding, the construction is expected to complete by end-October 2025, and we hope to be able to move back in early 2026. We look to you for support in helping us with this essential project, which will enable us to serve over 200 children on a daily basis.

Renovation of Palna Nurses' quarters

The Palna nurses' quarters underwent an urgently needed renovation, which had been pending since the pandemic, and needed immediate attention. Mayawala Trust and other donors supported this project.

New Vehicle

We were able to replace the 14-year old DCCW vehicle with a new one, due to the generous support of Gateway Distriparks Ltd.

<u>Systems</u>

The project of digitising the records of all Palna children since 1978, which was started last year, was completed, along with a data entry and retrieval software. This addresses a long-felt need, to improve the efficiency of Palna systems.

A pilot of a beneficiary-level MIS has been rolled out and will be deployed across all our programmes in the coming year.

Annual General Meeting

The **DCCW Annual General Meeting** for 2023-24 was held on 27th September 2024 at the DCCW head office. A brief summary of the year and the <u>Annual Report</u> were presented by Ms. Radhika Minocha, Hony President, and the annual audited accounts were summarised by Mr, Ishwinder Singh, Hony Treasurer. General Secretary Asheesh Vaderaa discussed the reconstruction of the Janakpuri centre and stressed on the critical need for funding to complete this project.
