Spotlight - Educational Sponsorship Alumni

Since its inception in 1979, DCCW's Educational Sponsorship programme has benefited over 40,000 children, enabling them to continue with their school education, and counselling them on a career path aligned with their interests. Year after year we celebrate Educational Sponsorship Day to felicitate young children who have excelled not just in academics but also in other skills like art & craft, music & dance. The cultural show put up by the children showcases these skills. A celebratory day for the children as well as their parents, and an inspiration for other children to emulate and excel. This year the annual function was organised on Children's Day, 14th November.

In our Spotlight column this time we highlight some of the alumni from this year.







Kiran comes from an underprivileged, broken family, with her father deserting the family when she was just eight years old. Thereafter her mother found it extremely difficult to continue Kiran's and her sibling's education in the local private school where they were studying. Working as an Anganwadi worker she struggled to support her family single-handedly, despite the fact that they lived with their maternal grandparents, who were pillars of strength for all of them. Kiran enrolled in our Educational Sponsorship programme when she was in Class IV, which eased the burden on her mother. Despite all odds, Kiran was determined to excel in her studies as she saw it as the one way forward towards becoming independent, and her efforts bore fruit as she scored 93 % in her class with no extra tuitions. She has also been awarded a one-time financial assistance to prepare for the School Service Commission examination, to help her pursue her dreams.

Charu lives with her family of four members - her father is a helper in a shop and mother a homemaker. Charu was a very active child and good in studies. She enrolled in our Educational Sponsorship programme when she was in Class IV. She regularly participated in all extra-curricular activities in school as well as in our annual Sponsorship Day.

Career counseling got her thinking about various options other than graduation. She explored all possibilities while preparing for her board examinations, in which she scored 88%. Then she opted for a Graduate Vocational course in Tourism Management from Delhi University, where she has successfully cleared the entrance exam and secured a seat.

Nishta's father is a tailor and her mother is a homemaker She was a bright student since the beginning. She enrolled in our programme in 2008.During stipend disbursement she was counseled by our Executive members to study hard as well as focus on extracurricular for overall development. This really inspired her and she decided to do something which would make her family proud. In her boards she scored 86% and simultaneously cleared the DIET, the 2-year Teacher Training program of the government.

We have supported her with one-time financial assistance towards her professional course. We are proud of all of them and wish them the best for a bright future.
