DCCW Annual General Meeting for 2022-23 for 2022-23 was held on 29th September at the DCCW head office. The Annual Report was presented at the meeting by Ms Radhika Minocha, Hony President, and the annual audited accounts were summarised by Mr Ishwinder Singh, Hony Treasurer. General Secretary Asheesh Vaderaa discussed the massive challenges that lie ahead due to the Janakpuri centre having to be rebuilt, and the overall need for funds for our programmes

In August, a transformative workshop was conducted by **Dr S Senapati, Assistant Director, National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development**, for our pre-school educators of the Palna WeeKids programme. The session was focused on promoting holistic development through various strategies. Teachers acquired skills to nurture learning skills and gained invaluable insights into ECCE (Early Childhood Care and Education), which is essential for enhancing children's motor, cognitive and socio emotional aptitudes. The session concluded with practical exercises and group discussions.

In July, **Tirath Ram Shah Charitable Hospital**, during their CSR camp, connected with Palna. Their highly trained and experienced team of experts including behaviour therapists, psychologists, speech therapists, and special educators, conducted assessments of the children under the supervision of a pediatrician.
